Study course objective: The aim of Criminal Law Study Course is to familiarize students with basic concepts from the general and special part of the criminal law science, as well as with the criminal legislation of Republic Serbia.			
Study course outcome: Ability to implement in practice provisions of the Criminal Code to specific criminal events.			
Contents of the course			
<i>Lectures</i> Within the general part of the Criminal Law, the basic thematic areas are the concept, the subject and the sources (internal and international acts and their legal relationship), the general concept of criminal offense, (concretization of the principles of legality, iter criminis, complicity), general notion of guilt, constitutive elements (accountability, vindication, forms of vindication, intent, and negligence) misconception, and criminal sanctions (notion, type, penalty system, parallel law comparability). The special part teaches about the system of individual crimes and their grouping. The most important crimes from the selected parts are analyzed (against life and body, humanity and international law, property, against state regulation, etc.).			
<i>Practice classes</i> The subject is of a theoretical type, so Practice classes refers to practice classes of the type of analysis of criminal legal norms, international acts and their comparison, analysis of cases from case-law, selected problems for understanding terms and concepts and analyzing the criminal offense substance.
